

Its Construction

We have endeavored to make the Vacuum Bait as perfect in detail as Professor Howe has evolved it in efficiency. Each bait is made of carbon.

It is in a special hinged cover of cast metal, requiring eight coats, making it hard, durable and waterproof. It is accurately weighted so as to be of proper balance and is a perfect casting bait. Metal parts are made of brass, nickel finish. Best quality of imported hooks are used, and impossible in proper use to break one; however can be easily replaced. Owing to its peculiar shape, is quite weedless—the wings of the bait serving additional duty in diverting much vegetation from the hooks.

Each bait is packed in a durable hinged-cover metal box.

Its Efficiency

This bait has proven successful from early developments of aquatic vegetation in the spring until the formation of ice in the fall. It has proven its superiority in calm, clear weather, the equal of all on rough or cloudy days, and the most phenomenal moonlight and starlight bait. It has demonstrated its superiority in every way and wherever tried. The first Vacuum Bait ever made has a record of seventy-six bass landed out of seventy-nine strikes, catching the first twenty-six without a miss. It makes casting more fascinating and successful at all times.

Moonlight and Starlight Fishing

"Bass feed much at night," be it moonlight, starlight or dark. Casting by moonlight or starlight is ideal sport and often most successful. Is good from May to November. The opportunity of avoiding the heat of midsummer days and enjoying the beauties of the night, with the assurance of equal chances for a good catch, has added many a charm and success to the sport. The Vacuum Bait makes good any day or night.

Suggestions

Use no snap or swivel and attach line direct to bait. Keep hooks sharp. Cast as usual, to edge of rushes, lily-pads, dock or moss, both day or night, retrieving bait slowly, so two rolls of water may be seen to be passing just above the two wings of the bait. Reeling too fast will cause a sheet of water to pass entirely over and above the bait, forming a perfect vacuum, from which it derives its name. When a strike is received, continue reeling slowly until the power of the fish is felt, holding firmly enough upon him for a moment, when his fighting will set the hooks best. Keep line taut and never over-power fish or tackle. In trolling, let bait pass over or near deepest moss that can be seen. Dry baits to prevent rust before returning to box.
